2	SEC. 7. REPORT ON IMPACTS ON THE ISLAMIC REPUBLIC	
3	OF IRAN OF SANCTIONS IMPOSED BY THE

5	(a) In General.—Not later than 90 days after the	
6	date of the enactment this Act, the Secretary of State,	
7	in consultation with the Secretary of the Treasury and	
8	drawing on subject-matter experts including economists	
9	and statisticians from the Department of State and the	
10	Department of the Treasury, shall submit to the appro-	

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1	priate congressional committees a report on the impacts
2	on the Islamic Republic of Iran of sanctions imposed by
3	the United States.
4	(b) Elements.—The report required by subsection
5	(a) shall include an assessment of the following:
6	(1) The impact of sanctions imposed by the
7	United States on the following:
8	(A) Problematic activities and policies of
9	the Islamic Republic of Iran, including ballistic
10	missile development, proliferation of Iranian
11	drones and missiles to state and non-state ac-
12	tors, uranium enrichment, and funding of ter-
13	rorist groups in the "Axis of Resistance", and
14	how sanctions have meaningfully impacted the
15	ability of such groups to operate.
16	(B) Key officials of the Iranian regime, in-
17	cluding their access to alternative financial
18	markets, their standard of living, and impacts
19	to their personal wealth.
20	(C) The operations of independent civil so-
21	ciety organizations in Iran, including the ability
22	of such organizations to access products that
23	would allow them to document and share
24	human rights abuses, promote democratic
25	norms, and engage in political dissent.

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1	(D) The efficacy of licensing actions aimed
2	at ensuring the people of Iran have access to
3	circumvention technologies around Iranian re-
4	gime firewalls and censors to promote internet
5	freedom, including General License D-2 of the
6	Department of the Treasury.
7	(E) The standard of living of the people of
8	Iran, including—
9	(i) the impact on the purchasing
10	power of the people of Iran and their abil-
11	ity to afford and acquire food and medi-
12	cine; and
13	(ii) changes in the size of the working
14	and middle classes in Iran, including im-
15	pacts to the poverty rate in Iran.
16	(F) The growth of unofficial economies
17	controlled by officials of the Iranian regime and
18	members of the Islamic Revolutionary Guard
19	Corps.
20	(2) What industries in Iran remain unaffected
21	by such sanctions.
