U.S. SENATE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS

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1	The committee met, pursuant to notice, at 2:14 p.m. in Room S-216, The Capitol,
2	Hon. John F. Kerry, chairman of the committee, presiding.
3	PRESENT. Senators Kerry [presiding], Boxer, Menendez, Cardin, Casey, Webb,
4	Shaheen, Coons, Durbin, Udall, Lugar, Rubio, and Lee.
	OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. JOHN F. KERRY, U.S. SENATOR FROM MASSACHUSETTS
5	THE CHAIRMAN. The committee will come to order.
6	I am just going to quickly start the process so we can accelerate for everybody
7	here. We are actually a minute early, but this way, we can accelerate it notwithstanding
8	we have some Republicans coming.
9	Just very quickly, while we wait to get a full quorum in order to be able to vote,
10	we are going to be passing on the nomination of the first Ambassador to South Sudan,
11	and you know, I just want to say that I think everybody here ought to be pleased with
12	the diplomacy of the last few years. It is a success story really for efforts made under
13	the Comprehensive Peace Agreement. To his credit, President George Bush got John

Danforth involved as a Special Envoy, and he did a terrific job in helping sort of bring
what others had already been engaged in in the CPA. And it was kind of languishing,
to be honest with you, about a year and a half,2 years ago. It did not look like we
would get over the line, and a lot of folks got involved in it. Happily it moved to the
point of a vote on independence, a referendum, and then subsequently the actual
moment of independence.

And Susan Page, who is the nominee, was present at the creation of the world's
newest country. She was one of the mediators on the Comprehensive Peace Agreement,
and I think it is particularly fitting she is going to return now as the first Ambassador.
So that is a really nice note.

11 Immediately after the business meeting, Senator Shaheen is going to be chairing 12 the nomination hearing for Mike McFall to be our next Ambassador to Russia, and I think this is a good opportunity for members of the committee, who want to, to 13 14 examine this complicated but very important relationship with Moscow. 15 And then turning to today's agenda, we have got a number of important 16 nominations, in addition to South Sudan, the nominees for Bahrain, Luxembourg, 17 Bangladesh, Sweden, Cape Verde, Mali, and some other positions. And we are 18 considering three Foreign Service officer lists.

1	So I would like to move all of the nominations out of committee today. I do not
2	know of any requests for a roll call on any of the agenda items. So I would propose, if
3	there is a motion to do so, to have a vote en bloc on the entire agenda.
4	Senator Boxer. So moved.
5	THE CHAIRMAN. Do we have enough people to do that?
6	SENATOR CASEY. Mr. Chairman, may I say a word about Bahrain?
7	THE CHAIRMAN. Positively, sure.
8	SENATOR CASEY. Just really quickly, I just want to highlight the administration
9	has been considering an arms sale to Bahrain. I believe and I think this is widely
10	shared that based upon the repression of democratic reform in that country, that we
11	should delay that. I sent a letter, joined by Senator Menendez, Senator Cardin, Senator
12	Durbin, and Senator Wyden, to the administration to do that. And I want to make that
13	point as we are considering the ambassadorial nomination.
14	THE CHAIRMAN. Fair enough.
15	Anybody else want to be heard?
16	SENATOR RUBIO. Mr. Chairman?
17	THE CHAIRMAN. Senator Rubio?
18	SENATOR RUBIO. I just want to echo that as well. I think we should all be
19	concerned about the direction that Bahrain has gone. I know we were trying to work
20	with your office on, within the next few days, trying to put together a letter as well that

1	elicits our concern as well about the direction of that and giving arms sales as a
2	potential leverage point to make our case on that issue.
3	THE CHAIRMAN. Fair enough. Let me just say to everybody that I think
4	everybody shares those concerns. I know I do.
5	But I also share a concern for our strategic interests in the region and some very
6	delicate balance with respect to those interests. Bahrain is an interesting place. There
7	have been actually, notwithstanding the obvious problems of the democratic reform at
8	this point, it is a country that has engaged in a lot more reform up until the uprisings
9	than almost any other country in the region. That is number one.
10	Number two, there are obviously other important strategic interests with respect
11	to Bahrain. Always we have to assert the rights and democratization and reform
12	efforts. But I would caution us to think carefully about how best to achieve those at this
13	particular moment. I have talked to Senator Wyden and others who have some
14	concerns about it, and I have talked to the Secretary, Secretary Clinton, about it.
15	I think it may be thoughtful for us and we should convene and talk about this -
16	- to maybe do a sense of the Senate that expresses some of those concerns and works
17	constructively to try to move forward but also does not preclude sort of shooting
18	ourselves in the foot and not leveraging some of the things that we have. Everybody
19	knows we had a very high-cost event with Saudi Arabia as a consequence of the

1	Mubarak transition, and given what you all will be briefed on later today about Iran, I
2	think it is important to just be thoughtful and cautious about it.
3	So that is what I would say, and I would love to chat with you about the concept
4	of a sense of the Senate maybe as a way to express some of our concerns.
5	SENATOR BOXER. Mr. Chairman?
6	The Chairman. Yes.
7	SENATOR BOXER. I did not get to go on your letter. I wanted to but it took a little
8	longer because my initial sense was tempering what you were telling me, which was
9	very unhappy, with what John Kerry has said. Since I am so proud that I am the
10	chairman of the Human Rights Subcommittee here, it is hard to turn your back on the
11	people who have written to us about this.
12	So, Senator Rubio, I worked with you on your letter. You are talking about the
13	3P Human Security, Arms Control Association, Freedom House, Human Rights First,
14	Just Foreign Policy, Peace Action West, United Methodist Church, Norwegian Forum
15	for Environment and Development, Physicians for Human Rights, The Friends
16	Committee, Human Rights Watch, Open Society Policy Center, Project on Middle East
17	Democracy. And when you go into their letter, what you find out is there has been a
18	fierce crackdown there, more than 40 people killed by security forces, and four died
19	from torture and medical neglect. More than 1,600 people have been arrested. And it

goes on and on about religious sites being destroyed and people being fired on, et
 cetera.

3	And so we are that beacon, and I just think we need to do more than a sense of
4	the Senate. I would support that. I think it does not do any harm. I think it is good.
5	But, you know, my staff tells me when they went to a meeting about this, the big
6	driving force was some arms sales person who said, well, the price of these missiles are
7	going up in a week or 2. This is very, very serious.
8	And so I wanted to commend Senator Casey. I did not want to even read this
9	letter because my heart goes in the direction that says is it not wonderful the Arab
10	Spring. But yet, still I do not think we can turn our backs on this. So I hope that we will
11	send a strong signal to the administration on this, and I hope that we will do what
12	Senator Kerry wants to do. I think it is in our strategic interest that these revolutions go
13	well, that these evolutions go well. So I am concerned and again want to praise my
14	colleague for taking the lead on this.
15	THE CHAIRMAN. Thank you, Senator Boxer. Absolutely. And one thing I assure
16	every member of the committee is we are not going to turn our backs on it.
17	We are waiting for a motion to entertain an en bloc vote and get everybody out
18	of here.
19	SENATOR BOXER. So moved.
20	Senator Lugar. Second.

1	THE CHAIRMAN. Is there any further debate?
2	[No response.]
3	THE CHAIRMAN. If there is none, all in favor say aye.
4	[Chorus of ayes.]
5	THE CHAIRMAN. All opposed, nay.
6	[No response.]
7	THE CHAIRMAN. The ayes have it.
8	We have concluded our business. Thank you very much
