1	The committee met, pursuant to notice, at 2:20 p.m. in Room S-116, The Capitol, Hon.
2	Robert Menendez, chairman of the committee, presiding.
3	PRESENT. Senators Menendez [presiding], Casey, Cardin, Kaine, Murphy, Shaheen, Coons,
4	Udall, Corker, and McCain.
	OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. BOB MENENDEZ, U.S. SENATOR FROM NEW JERSEY
5	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> The committee will come to order. I want to thank everybody for coming.
6	Under these rules we can start our discussion. We will still need a few more members for a vote,
7	but I think it is worth it, especially in consideration of all those who made it on time, to start, and
8	then we will be able to move along.
9	So first — we have two legislative items on the agenda and two nominations. The first
10	legislative item is S. 793, the OAS Revitalization and Reform Act, which I introduced along with
11	Senators Corker, Udall, and Rubio. As I am sure you all know, the OAS is the premiere
12	multilateral institution for the Americas, but it has critical reforms that are long overdue.
13	The bill seeks to achieve more transparent priority setting and results-driven budget
14	planning and personnel practices at the OAS, which we think is essential. It does not prescribe

1	solutions. Instead, it directs the Secretary of State to devise a multi-year strategy whereby our U.S.
2	mission at the OAS will work in coordination with other member-states for the adoption of
3	institutional reforms.
4	And our objective here is a strong and effective OAS that will promote peace and security,
5	strengthen democracy and the rule of law, and advance human rights in the Western Hemisphere.
6	The bipartisan bill marks an important contribution to that effort.
7	And I am happy to entertain Senator Corker's remarks on this if he has any, and then I will
8	turn to other members.
9	<b>SENATOR CORKER.</b> I think yours were so eloquent, I hate to foul them up in any way. Thank
10	you.
11	[Laughter.]
12	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Would you make sure you give me a copy of that?
13	[Laughter.]
14	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Thank you. Thank you for your work with us together and your staff to
15	make this happen.
16	Senator Udall?
17	SENATOR UDALL. Ditto on that.
18	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> All right. Anyone else who wants to speak on this?
19	[No response.]

1	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Okay, we have one more, so we will hold off. I am going to ask for a roll call
2	when we have the appropriate quorum for voting purposes.
3	Second, we have S. 579, which is a bill to direct the Secretary of State to develop a strategy
4	to obtain observer status for Taiwan at the Triennial International Civil Aviation Organization
5	Assembly, and for other purposes.
6	Taiwan is one of the world's major passenger and cargo markets. It provides air traffic
7	control services to over 1.2 million flights per year. Last year, Taiwan joined the U.S. visa waiver
8	program, and I expect that travel between Taiwan and the United States will increase rapidly as a
9	result. Allowing the government of Taiwan observer status at ICAO assemblies will ensure that it
10	has the access to the technical information it needs to continue to align its civil aviation practices
11	with evolving international safety standards.
12	We are joined on that bill with Senator Inhofe, as well as others, and welcome anybody's
13	comments who may have anything they want to say. Senator Corker, do you have anything?
14	SENATOR CORKER. I really do not. We had a lot of discussion in our office about this, but, you
15	know, certainly we will support it. And I think we continue to — there is probably a broader
16	discussion at some point we ought to have overall about our China and Taiwan policy, and yet we
17	have no issue with this and plan to support it.
18	TUE QUALDMAN Anyong also on this particular resolution?
	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Anyone else on this particular resolution?
19	[No response.]

1	Finally, we have two nominations on today's agenda: Deborah Kay Jones to be the
2	ambassador to Libya, and James Knight to be the ambassador to the Republic of Chad. Let me just
3	briefly speak to both of the nominations.
4	In Deborah Jones, the President has nominated someone who is a career senior foreign
5	service officer of the highest caliber to take on what I think is a critical assignment. Ambassador
6	Jones has served in top postings throughout the Middle East, from Baghdad to Damascus. She will
7	need to hit the ground running, and I am confident she is up to the task.
8	We all know the challenges facing Libya at this critical moment. Political transition is under
9	way. A recent law designed to bar Gaddafi-era officials from office could sow the seeds of
10	instability down the road. Oil production is up, but questions remain about how the revenues will
11	reach the people through social services, investments, and infrastructure. And what is more, the
12	security situation is precarious, as we saw by a recent car bombing outside the French embassy in
13	Tripoli, as well as kidnappings and assassination attempts on public officials, which underscores
14	the dangers posed by militia groups that continue to operate with impunity.
15	There is simply no substitute — no substitute — for having a confirmed U.S. ambassador on
16	the ground reaching outside the wire to the Libyan people as they shape a safer, more productive,
17	and inclusive future. And I urge my colleagues to support Ambassador Jones' nomination.
18	And this is also a critical moment for our engagement with Chad. The Sahel is emerging as
19	an increasingly significant strategic region, and Chad is currently the largest African troop
20	contributor to multilateral military operations in Mali.

1	Ambassador Knight brings over two decades of experience, much of it in Africa, to the post.
2	And I certainly urge my colleagues to support his nomination as well.
3	I invite — at this point, having gone through a discussion of the OAS legislation, the Taiwan
4	International Civil Aviation Organization resolution, and the two nominees, I invite anyone to add
5	to the discussion we have had on the two pieces of legislation.
6	Senator Corker?
7	<b>SENATOR CORKER.</b> No, we had a good hearing on the nominees. I support them also. I want
8	to thank you for your leadership on all of these issues. And I would hope that with the $-$ I think
9	we have a quorum now, is that correct?
10	The Chairman. Yes.
11	SENATOR CORKER. That we might move these by voice.
12	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Anyone else on the nominees or the legislation?
13	SENATOR MCCAIN. I think the lady is from Alabama.
14	THE CHAIRMAN. Senator Shaheen?
15	SENATOR SHAHEEN. I just wanted to echo your words about Deborah Kay Jones. I had a
16	chance to meet with her when I was in Kuwait with Senator Casey, in fact. As you point out, she
17	has a lot of experience in the Middle East. She is a career diplomat. And as you also said, having a
18	confirmed ambassador in Libya is going to be very important.
19	I certainly hope once this committee has voted on her, that we will be able to move her
20	nomination on the floor as expeditiously as possible because as we are talking about all of the

2	United States' foreign policy is very important.
3	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> Any other members seeking recognition on either of those?
4	[No response.]
5	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> With that, then I will ask — since I am not aware of a request for a recorded
6	vote, I will ask for a voice vote on both pieces of legislation as well as the two nominees.
7	All those in favor, say aye?
8	[A chorus of ayes.]
9	THE CHAIRMAN. Opposed, say nay?
10	[No response.]
11	<b>THE CHAIRMAN.</b> The ayes have it. Both the legislation and the nominees are favorably
12	reported.
13	And with that, this meeting is adjourned. Thank you.
