3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Senator Paul Simon5 Water for the World Act of 2014".

6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

7 It is the sense of Congress that—

8 (1) water and sanitation are critically important
9 resources that impact many other aspects of human
10 life; and

(2) the United States should be a global leaderin helping provide sustainable access to clean water

1	and sanitation for the world's most vulnerable popu-
2	lations.
3	SEC. 3. CLARIFICATION OF ASSISTANCE TO PROVIDE SAFE
4	WATER AND SANITATION TO INCLUDE HY-
5	GIENE.
6	Chapter 1 of part I of the Foreign Assistance Act
7	of 1961 is amended—
8	(1) by redesignating section 135 (22 U.S.C.
9	2152h), as added by section $5(a)$ of the Senator
10	Paul Simon Water for the Poor Act of 2005 (Public
11	Law 109–121; 22 U.S.C. 2152h note), as section
12	136; and
13	(2) in section 136, as redesignated—
14	(A) in the section heading, by striking
15	"AND SANITATION" and inserting ", SANITA-
16	TION, AND HYGIENE"; and
17	(B) in subsection (b), by striking "and
18	sanitation" and inserting ", sanitation, and hy-
19	giene".
20	SEC. 4. IMPROVING COORDINATION AND OVERSIGHT OF
21	SAFE WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE
22	PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES.
23	Section 136 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961,
24	as redesignated and amended by this Act, is further
25	amended by adding at the end the following:

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1	"(e) Coordination and Oversight.—
2	"(1) USAID GLOBAL WATER COORDINATOR.—
3	"(A) DESIGNATION.—The Administrator
4	of the United States Agency for International
5	Development (referred to in this paragraph as
6	'USAID') or the Administrator's designee, who
7	shall be a current USAID employee serving in
8	a career or non-career position in the Senior
9	Executive Service or at the level of a Deputy
10	Assistant Administrator or higher, shall serve
11	concurrently as the USAID Global Water Coor-
12	dinator (referred to in this subsection as the
13	'Coordinator').
14	"(B) Specific duties.—The Coordinator
15	shall—
16	"(i) provide direction and guidance to,
17	coordinate, and oversee the projects and
18	programs of USAID authorized under this
19	section;
20	"(ii) lead the implementation and re-
21	vision, not less frequently than once every
22	5 years, of USAID's portion of the Global
23	Water Strategy required under subsection
24	(j);
25	"(iii) seek—

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1	"(I) to expand the capacity of
2	USAID, subject to the availability of
3	appropriations, including through the
4	designation of a lead subject matter
5	expert selected from among USAID
6	staff in each high priority country
7	designated pursuant to subsection (h);
8	"(II) to implement such pro-
9	grams and activities;
10	"(III) to take advantage of
11	economies of scale; and
12	"(IV) to conduct more efficient
13	and effective projects and programs;
14	"(iv) coordinate with the Department
15	of State and USAID staff in each high pri-
16	ority country designated pursuant to sub-
17	section (h) to ensure that USAID activities
18	and projects, USAID program planning
19	and budgeting documents, and USAID
20	country development strategies reflect and
21	seek to implement—
22	"(I) the safe water, sanitation,
23	and hygiene objectives established in
24	the strategy required under subsection

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1	(j), including objectives relating to the
2	management of water resources; and
3	"(II) international best practices
4	relating to—
5	"(aa) increasing access to
6	safe water and sanitation;
7	"(bb) conducting hygiene-re-
8	lated activities; and
9	"(cc) ensuring appropriate
10	management of water resources;
11	and
12	"(v) develop appropriate benchmarks,
13	measurable goals, performance metrics,
14	and monitoring and evaluation plans for
15	USAID projects and programs authorized
16	under this section.
17	"(2) Department of state special coordi-
18	NATOR FOR WATER RESOURCES.—
19	"(A) DESIGNATION.—The Secretary of
20	State or the Secretary's designee, who shall be
21	a current employee of the Department of State
22	serving in a career or non-career position in the
23	Senior Executive Service or at the level of a
24	Deputy Assistant Secretary or higher, shall
25	serve concurrently as the Department of State

1	Special Advisor for Water Resources (referred
2	to in this paragraph as the 'Special Advisor').
3	"(B) Specific duties.—The Special Ad-
4	visor shall—
5	"(i) provide direction and guidance to,
6	coordinate, and oversee the projects and
7	programs of the Department of State au-
8	thorized under this section;
9	"(ii) lead the implementation and re-
10	vision, not less than every 5 years, of the
11	Department of State's portion of the Glob-
12	al Water Strategy required under sub-
13	section (j);
14	"(iii) prioritize and coordinate the De-
15	partment of State's international engage-
16	ment on the allocation, distribution, and
17	access to global fresh water resources and
18	policies related to such matters;
19	"(iv) coordinate with United States
20	Agency for International Development and
21	Department of State staff in each high pri-
22	ority country designated pursuant to sub-
23	section (h) to ensure that United States
24	diplomatic efforts related to safe water,
25	sanitation, and hygiene, including efforts

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1	related to management of water resources
2	and watersheds and the resolution of intra-
3	and trans-boundary conflicts over water re-
4	sources, are consistent with United States
5	national interests; and
6	"(v) represent the views of the United
7	States Government on the allocation, dis-
8	tribution, and access to global fresh water
9	resources and policies related to such mat-
10	ters in key international fora, including
11	key diplomatic, development-related, and
12	scientific organizations.
13	"(3) Additional nature of duties and re-
14	STRICTION ON ADDITIONAL OR SUPPLEMENTAL COM-
15	PENSATION.—The responsibilities and specific duties
16	of the Administrator of the United States Agency
17	for International Development (or the Administra-
18	tor's designee) and the Secretary of State (or the
19	Secretary's designee) under paragraph (2) or (3), re-
20	spectively, shall be in addition to any other respon-
21	sibilities or specific duties assigned to such individ-
22	uals. Such individuals shall receive no additional or
23	supplemental compensation as a result of carrying
24	out such responsibilities and specific duties under
25	such paragraphs.".

1	SEC. 5. PROMOTING THE MAXIMUM IMPACT AND LONG-
2	TERM SUSTAINABILITY OF USAID SAFE
3	WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE-RELATED
4	PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS.
5	Section 136 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961,
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6 as redesignated and amended by this Act, is further7 amended by adding at the end the following:

8 "(f) PRIORITIES AND CRITERIA FOR MAXIMUM IM-9 PACT AND LONG-TERM SUSTAINABILITY.—The Adminis-10 trator of the United States Agency for International De-11 velopment shall ensure that the Agency for International 12 Development's projects and programs authorized under 13 this section are designed to achieve maximum impact and 14 long-term sustainability by—

15 "(1) prioritizing countries on the basis of the
16 following clearly defined criteria and indicators, to
17 the extent sufficient empirical data are available—

18 "(A) the proportion of the population19 using an unimproved drinking water source;

20 "(B) the total population using an unim21 proved drinking water source;

22 "(C) the proportion of the population with-23 out piped water access;

24 "(D) the proportion of the population
25 using shared or other unimproved sanitation fa26 cilities;

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1	"(E) the total population using shared or
2	other unimproved sanitation facilities;
3	"(F) the proportion of the population prac-
4	ticing open defecation;
5	"(G) the total number of children younger
6	than 5 years of age who died from diarrheal
7	disease;
8	"(H) the proportion of all deaths of chil-
9	dren younger than 5 years of age resulting from
10	diarrheal disease;
11	"(I) the national government's capacity,
12	capability, and commitment to work with the
13	United States to improve access to safe water,
14	sanitation, and hygiene, including—
15	"(i) the government's capacity and
16	commitment to developing the indigenous
17	capacity to provide safe water and sanita-
18	tion without the assistance of outside do-
19	nors; and
20	"(ii) the degree to which such govern-
21	ment—
22	"(I) identifies such efforts as a
23	priority; and
24	"(II) allocates resources to such
25	efforts;

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"(J) the availability of opportunities to le-2 verage existing public, private, or other donor 3 investments in the water, sanitation, and hy-4 giene sectors, including investments in the man-5 agement of water resources; and

6 "(K) the likelihood of making significant 7 improvements on a per capita basis on the 8 health and educational opportunities available 9 to women as a result of increased access to safe 10 water, sanitation, and hygiene, including access 11 to appropriate facilities at primary and sec-12 ondary educational institutions seeking to en-13 sure that communities benefitting from such 14 projects and activities develop the indigenous 15 capacity to provide safe water and sanitation without the assistance of outside donors; 16

17 "(2) prioritizing and measuring, including 18 through rigorous monitoring and evaluating mecha-19 nisms, the extent to which such project or pro-20 gram—

"(A) 21 furthers significant improvements 22 in—

23 "(i) the criteria set forth in subpara-24 graphs (A) through (H) of paragraph (1);

1	"(ii) the health and educational op-
2	portunities available to women as a result
3	of increased access to safe water, sanita-
4	tion, and hygiene, including access to ap-
5	propriate facilities at primary and sec-
6	ondary educational institutions; and
7	"(iii) the indigenous capacity of the
8	host nation or community to provide safe
9	water and sanitation without the assistance
10	of outside donors;
11	"(B) is designed, as part of the provision
12	of safe water and sanitation to the local com-
13	munity—
14	"(i) to be financially independent over
15	the long term, focusing on local ownership
16	and sustainability;
17	"(ii) to be undertaken in conjunction
18	with relevant public institutions or private
19	enterprises;
20	"(iii) to identify and empower local in-
21	dividuals or institutions to be responsible
22	for the effective management and mainte-
23	nance of such project or program; and
24	"(iv) to provide safe water or exper-
25	tise or capacity building to those identified

1	parties or institutions for the purposes of
2	developing a plan and clear responsibilities
3	for the effective management and mainte-
4	nance of such project or program;
5	"(C) leverages existing public, private, or
6	other donor investments in the water, sanita-
7	tion, and hygiene sectors, including investments
8	in the management of water resources;
9	"(D) avoids duplication of efforts with
10	other United States Government agencies or de-
11	partments or those of other nations or non-
12	governmental organizations;
13	"(E) coordinates such efforts with the ef-
14	forts of other United States Government agen-
15	cies or departments or those of other nations or
16	nongovernmental organizations directed at as-
17	sisting refugees and other displaced individuals;
18	and
19	"(F) involves consultation with appropriate
20	stakeholders, including communities directly af-
21	fected by the lack of access to clean water, sani-
22	tation or hygiene, and other appropriate non-
23	governmental organizations; and
24	"(3) seeking to further the strategy required
25	under subsection (j) after 2018.

"(g) Use of Current and Improved Empirical 1 2 DATA COLLECTION AND REVIEW OF NEW STANDARDIZED 3 INDICATORS.— 4 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator of the 5 United States Agency for International Development 6 is authorized to use current and improved empirical 7 data collection-"(A) 8 to meet the health-based 9 prioritization criteria established pursuant to 10 subsection (f)(1); and "(B) to review new standardized indicators 11 12 in evaluating progress towards meeting such 13 criteria. 14 "(2) CONSULTATION AND NOTICE.—The Ad-15 ministrator shall— "(A) regularly consult with the appropriate 16 17 congressional committees; and 18 "(B) notify such committees not later than 19 30 days before using current or improved em-20 pirical data collection for the review of any new 21 standardized indicators under paragraph (1) for 22 the purposes of carrying out this section. 23 "(h) DESIGNATION OF HIGH PRIORITY COUN-24 TRIES.—

1	"(1) INITIAL DESIGNATION.—Not later than
2	October 1, 2015, the President shall—
3	"(A) designate, on the basis of the criteria
4	set forth in subsection $(f)(1)$ not fewer than 10
5	countries as high priority countries to be the
6	primary recipients of United States Government
7	assistance authorized under this section during
8	fiscal year 2016; and
9	"(B) notify the appropriate congressional
10	committees of such designations.
11	"(2) ANNUAL DESIGNATIONS.—
12	"(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
13	subparagraph (B), the President shall annually
14	make new designations pursuant to the criteria
15	set forth in paragraph (1).
16	"(B) DESIGNATIONS AFTER FISCAL YEAR
17	2018.—Beginning with fiscal year 2019, des-
18	ignations under paragraph (1) shall be made—
19	"(i) based upon the criteria set forth
20	in subsection $(f)(1)$; and
21	"(ii) in furtherance of the strategy re-
22	quired under subsection (j).
23	"(i) TARGETING OF PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS TO
24	Areas of Greatest Need.—

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1 "(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 15 days be-2 fore the obligation of any funds for water, sanita-3 tion, or hygiene projects or programs pursuant to 4 this section in countries that are not ranked in the 5 top 50 countries based upon the WASH Needs 6 Index, the Administrator of the United States Agen-7 cy for International Development shall notify the ap-8 propriate congressional committees of the planned 9 obligation of such funds. 10 "(2) DEFINED TERM.—In this subsection and 11 in subsection (j), the term 'WASH Needs Index' 12 means the needs index for water, sanitation, or hy-13 giene projects or programs authorized under this 14 section that has been developed using the criteria 15 and indicators described in subparagraphs (A) 16 through (H) of subsection (f)(1).". 17 SEC. 6. UNITED STATES STRATEGY TO INCREASE APPRO-18 PRIATE LONG-TERM SUSTAINABILITY AND 19 ACCESS TO SAFE WATER, SANITATION, AND 20 HYGIENE. 21 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 136 of the Foreign Assist-22 ance Act of 1961, as redesignated and amended by this 23 Act, is further amended by adding at the end the following: 24

25 "(j) GLOBAL WATER STRATEGY.—

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1	"(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than October 1,
2	2017, and every 5 years thereafter, the President,
3	acting through the Secretary of State, the Adminis-
4	trator of the United States Agency for International
5	Development, and the heads of other Federal depart-
6	ments and agencies, as appropriate, shall submit a
7	single government-wide Global Water Strategy to the
8	appropriate congressional committees that provides a
9	detailed description of how the United States in-
10	tends—
11	"(A) to increase access to safe water, sani-
12	tation, and hygiene in high priority countries
13	designated pursuant to subsection (h), including
14	a summary of the WASH Needs Index and the
15	specific weighting of empirical data and other
16	definitions used to develop and rank countries
17	on the WASH Needs Index;
18	"(B) to improve the management of water
19	resources and watersheds in such countries; and
20	"(C) to work to prevent and resolve, to the
21	greatest degree possible, both intra- and trans-
22	boundary conflicts over water resources in such
23	countries.

1	"(2) AGENCY-SPECIFIC PLANS.—The Global
2	Water Strategy shall include an agency-specific
3	plan—
4	"(A) from the United States Agency for
5	International Development that describes spe-
6	cifically how the Agency for International De-
7	
	velopment will—
8	"(i) carry out the duties and respon-
9	sibilities assigned to the Global Water Co-
10	ordinator under subsection $(e)(1)$;
11	"(ii) ensure that the Agency for Inter-
12	national Development's projects and pro-
13	grams authorized under this section are
14	designed to achieve maximum impact and
15	long-term sustainability, including by im-
16	plementing the requirements described in
17	subsection (f); and
18	"(iii) increase access to safe water,
19	sanitation, and hygiene in high priority
20	countries designated pursuant to sub-
21	section (h);
22	"(B) from the Department of State that
23	describes specifically how the Department of
24	State will—

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1	"(i) carry out the duties and respon-
2	sibilities assigned to the Special Coordi-
3	nator for Water Resources under sub-
4	section $(e)(2)$; and
5	"(ii) ensure that the Department's ac-
6	tivities authorized under this section are
7	designed—
8	"(I) to improve management of
9	water resources and watersheds in
10	countries designated pursuant to sub-
11	section (h); and
12	"(II) to prevent and resolve, to
13	the greatest degree possible, both
14	intra- and trans-boundary conflicts
15	over water resources in such coun-
16	tries; and
17	"(C) from other Federal departments and
18	agencies, as appropriate, that describes the con-
19	tributions of the departments and agencies to
20	implementing the Global Water Strategy.
21	"(3) INDIVIDUALIZED PLANS FOR HIGH PRI-
22	ORITY COUNTRIES.—For each high priority country
23	designated pursuant to subsection (h), the Adminis-
24	trator of the United States Agency for International
25	Development shall—

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1	"(A) develop a costed, evidence-based, and
2	results-oriented plan that—
3	"(i) seeks to achieve the purposes of
4	this section; and
5	"(ii) meets the requirements under
6	subsection (f); and
7	"(B) include such plan in an appendix to
8	the Global Water Strategy required under para-
9	graph (1).
10	"(4) FIRST TIME ACCESS REPORTING REQUIRE-
11	MENT.—The Global Water Strategy shall specifically
12	describe the target percentage of funding for each
13	fiscal year covered by such strategy to be directed
14	toward projects aimed at providing first-time access
15	to safe water and sanitation.
16	"(5) Performance indicators.—The Global
17	Water Strategy shall include specific and measurable
18	goals, benchmarks, performance metrics, timetables,
19	and monitoring and evaluation plans required to be
20	developed by the Administrator of the United States
21	Agency for International Development pursuant to
22	subsection $(e)(1)(B)(v)$.
23	"(6) Consultation and best practices.—
24	The Global Water Strategy shall—

1	"(A) be developed in consultation with the
2	heads of other appropriate Federal departments
3	and agencies; and
4	"(B) incorporate best practices from the
5	international development community.
6	"(k) DEFINITIONS.—In this section—
7	"(1) the term 'appropriate congressional com-
8	mittees' means—
9	"(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations
10	of the Senate;
11	"(B) the Committee on Appropriations of
12	the Senate;
13	"(C) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
14	the House of Representatives; and
15	"(D) the Committee on Appropriations of
16	the House of Representatives; and
17	((2) the term 'long-term sustainability' refers
18	to the ability of a service delivery system, commu-
19	nity, partner, or beneficiary to maintain, over time,
20	any water, sanitation, or hygiene project that re-
21	ceives funding pursuant to the amendments made by
22	the Senator Paul Simon Water for the World Act of
23	2014.".
24	(b) Department of State Agency-Specific
25	PLAN.—Not later than 180 days after the date of enact-

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1 ment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall submit an
2 agency-specific plan to the appropriate congressional com3 mittees (as defined in section 136(k) of the Foreign As4 sistance Act of 1961, as added by subsection (a)) that
5 meets the requirements of section 136(j)(2)(B) of such
6 Act, as added by subsection (a).

7 (c) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 6 of the
8 Senator Paul Simon Water for the Poor Act of 2005 (Pub9 lic Law 109–121; 22 U.S.C. 2152h note) is repealed.
