3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Western Hemisphere5 Security Strategy Act of 2022".

6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

7 It is the sense of Congress that—

8 (1) the security, stability, prosperity, and state 9 of democratic governance in countries of the West-10 ern Hemisphere are vital to the national interests of 11 the United States;

1	(2) the harmful and malign influence in Latin
2	America and the Caribbean of the Government of
3	the People's Republic of China and the Government
4	of the Russian Federation poses risks to—
5	(A) the people and countries of Latin
6	America and the Caribbean; and
7	(B) the national interests of the United
8	States;
9	(3) the United States should expand its engage-
10	ment in the Western Hemisphere by—
11	(A) strengthening its alliances and part-
12	nerships with countries in the Western Hemi-
13	sphere;
14	(B) fostering security cooperation among
15	countries in the Western Hemisphere to facili-
16	tate trade, investment, training, and humani-
17	tarian assistance in the near and long term;
18	and
19	(C) working with security and law enforce-
20	ment agencies in the Western Hemisphere—
21	(i) to address the shared challenges
22	of—
23	(I) narcotics trafficking, human
24	trafficking, and other forms of illicit
25	trafficking; and

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1	(II) transnational criminal orga-
2	nizations; and
3	(ii) to support the rule of law, democ-
4	racy, and human rights in the region;
5	(4) the United States should maintain credible
6	security capabilities dedicated to Latin America and
7	the Caribbean—
8	(A) to build partner country capacity;
9	(B) to support the delivery of humani-
10	tarian assistance and disaster relief;
11	(C) to deter acts of aggression; and
12	(D) to respond, if necessary, to regional
13	threats and threats to the national security of
14	the United States; and
15	(5) the Department of State and the Depart-
16	ment of Defense should continue to commit addi-
17	tional assets and increase investments in the West-
18	ern Hemisphere so as to maintain robust United
19	States security partnerships with countries in the
20	Western Hemisphere.
21	SEC. 3. SECURITY STRATEGY FOR THE WESTERN HEMI-
22	SPHERE.
23	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
24	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State
25	and the Secretary of Defense shall jointly submit to the

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appropriate committees of Congress a multi-year strategy, 1 2 to be known as the "Western Hemisphere Security Strategy", for purposes of enhancing diplomatic engagement 3 4 and security assistance and cooperation, promoting re-5 gional security and stability, and advancing United States strategic interests in the Western Hemisphere. 6 7 (b) ELEMENTS.—The strategy required by subsection 8 (a) shall include the following: 9 (1) A proposal for increasing United States bi-10 lateral and multilateral security assistance and co-11 operation in Latin America and the Caribbean. 12 (2) Activities to build the defense and security 13 capacity of partner countries in Latin America and 14 the Caribbean. 15 (3) Activities to counter— 16 (A) malign influence by state actors; 17 (B) transnational criminal organizations 18 with connections to— 19 (i) illicit trafficking, including the il-20 licit trafficking of narcotics and weapons; 21 or 22 (ii) terrorism; and 23 (C) corruption and kleptocracy in govern-24 ments of countries in the Western Hemisphere.

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(4) Efforts to disrupt, degrade, and counter
 transnational illicit trafficking, with an emphasis on
 illicit narcotics and precursor chemicals that produce
 illicit narcotics.

5 (5) Activities to increase transparency in, and 6 support for, strong and accountable defense, secu-7 rity, and law enforcement institutions through insti-8 tutional capacity-building efforts, including efforts to 9 ensure respect for internationally recognized human 10 rights and direction and oversight by civilian au-11 thorities.

12 (6) Programs and initiatives to enhance public 13 diplomacy and engagement with the people of the 14 Western Hemisphere for the purpose of dem-15 onstrating that the security of their countries is en-16 hanced to a greater extent if their countries are 17 aligned with the United States and democratic val-18 ues rather than with authoritarian countries such as 19 the People's Republic of China and the Russian 20 Federation.

21 (7) Efforts to expand bilateral and multi22 national military training exercises with partner
23 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean.

24 (8) Humanitarian assistance and disaster relief25 initiatives to support partner countries by promoting

1	the development and growth of responsive institu-
2	tions through activities such as—
3	(A) the provision of appropriate equip-
4	ment, training, logistical support;
5	(B) transportation of humanitarian sup-
6	plies or personnel of foreign security forces;
7	(C) making available, preparing, and
8	transferring on-hand nonlethal supplies, and
9	providing training on the use of such supplies,
10	for humanitarian or health purposes to respond
11	to unforeseen emergencies;
12	(D) the provision of Department of State
13	humanitarian demining assistance; and
14	(E) conducting medical support operations
15	and medical humanitarian missions, such as
16	hospital ship deployments and base-operating
17	services, to the extent required by the oper-
18	ation.
19	(9) Continued support for the women, peace,
20	and security initiatives of the Department of State
21	to support the capacity of partner countries in the
22	Western Hemisphere—
23	(A) to ensure—
24	(i) the safety and security of women
25	and girls; and

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1	(ii) that the rights of women and girls
2	are protected; and
3	(B) to promote the meaningful participa-
4	tion of women in the defense and security sec-
5	tors.
6	(10) Professional military education initiatives,
7	such as the Department of State's International
8	Military and Education Training program.
9	(11) A detailed assessment of the resources re-
10	quired to carry out such strategy and a plan to be
11	executed not later than fiscal year 2023.
12	(c) Implementation.—
13	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after
14	the date on which the Western Hemisphere Security
15	Strategy is submitted under subsection (a), the Sec-
16	retary of State and the Secretary of Defense shall
17	commence implementation of the strategy.
18	(2) Briefing.—Not later than 180 days after
19	the date on which the implementation of the West-
20	ern Hemisphere Security Strategy commences, and
21	every 180 days thereafter, the Secretary of State
22	and the Secretary of Defense shall jointly provide a
23	briefing to the appropriate committees of Congress
24	on the implementation of the strategy.

1	(3) TERMINATION.—The authority under this
2	section shall terminate on the date that is three
3	years after the date of the enactment of this Act.
4	(d) Appropriate Committees of Congress De-
5	FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate commit-
6	tees of Congress" means—
7	(1) the Committee on Foreign Relations and
8	the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate; and
9	(2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the
10	Committee on Armed Services of the House of Rep-
11	resentatives.

10	(c) FORM.—The report required by subsection (a)
11	shall be submitted in unclassified form, but shall include
12	a classified annex, which shall include a list of the total
13	number of United States citizens and lawful permanent
14	residents detained or imprisoned in Venezuela as of the
15	date on which the report is submitted.
