3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "European Energy Se-
5	curity and Diversification Act of 2019".
6	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
7	In this Act:
8	(1) EARLY-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The
9	term "early-stage project support" includes—
10	(A) feasibility studies;

1	(B) resource evaluations;
2	(C) project appraisal and costing;
3	(D) pilot projects;
4	(E) commercial support, such as trade
5	missions, reverse trade missions, technical
6	workshops, international buyer programs, and
7	international partner searchers to link suppliers
8	to projects;
9	(F) technical assistance and other guid-
10	ance to improve the local regulatory environ-
11	ment and market frameworks to encourage
12	transparent competition and enhance energy se-
13	curity; and
14	(G) long-term energy sector planning.
15	(2) Late-stage project support.—The term
16	"late-stage project support" includes debt financing,
17	insurance, and transaction advisory services.
18	SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
19	(a) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
20	gress that the United States has economic and national
21	security interests in assisting European and Eurasian
22	countries achieve energy security through diversification
23	of their energy sources and supply routes.
24	(b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It is the policy of the
25	United States—

1	(1) to advance United States foreign policy and
2	development goals by assisting European and Eur-
3	asian countries to reduce their dependence on energy
4	resources from countries that use energy dependence
5	for undue political influence, such as the Russian
6	Federation, which has used natural gas to coerce, in-
7	timidate, and influence other countries;
8	(2) to promote the energy security of allies and
9	partners of the United States by encouraging the de-
10	velopment of accessible, transparent, and competitive
11	energy markets that provide diversified sources,
12	types, and routes of energy;
13	(3) to encourage United States public and pri-
14	vate sector investment in European energy infra-
15	structure projects to bridge the gap between energy
16	security requirements and commercial demand in a
17	way that is consistent with the region's absorptive
18	capacity; and
19	(4) to help facilitate the export of United States
20	energy resources, technology, and expertise to global
21	markets in a way that benefits the energy security
22	of allies and partners of the United States, including
23	in Europe and Eurasia.

1	SEC. 4. PRIORITIZATION OF EFFORTS AND ASSISTANCE
2	FOR ENERGY INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS
3	IN EUROPE AND EURASIA.
4	(a) In General.—In pursuing the policy described
5	in section 3, the Secretary of State, in coordination with
6	the Secretary of Energy and the heads of other relevant
7	United States agencies, shall, as appropriate, prioritize
8	and expedite the efforts of the Department of State and
9	those agencies in supporting the efforts of the European
10	Commission and the governments of European and Eur-
11	asian countries to increase their energy security, including
12	through—
13	(1) providing diplomatic and political support to
14	the European Commission and those governments,
15	as necessary—
16	(A) to facilitate international negotiations
17	concerning cross-border infrastructure;
18	(B) to enhance Europe's regulatory envi-
19	ronment with respect to energy; and
20	(C) to develop accessible, transparent, and
21	competitive energy markets supplied by diverse
22	sources, types, and routes of energy; and
23	(2) providing support to improve European en-
24	ergy markets, including early-stage project support
25	and late-stage project support for the construction

1	or improvement of energy infrastructure, as nec-
2	essary—
3	(A) to diversify the energy sources and
4	supply routes of European and Eurasian coun-
5	tries;
6	(B) to enhance energy market integration
7	across the region; and
8	(C) to increase competition within energy
9	markets.
10	(b) Project Selection.—
11	(1) In general.—The agencies described in
12	subsection (a) shall identify energy infrastructure
13	projects that would be appropriate for United States
14	assistance under this section.
15	(2) Project eligibility.—A project is eligible
16	for United States assistance under this section if the
17	project—
18	(A)(i) improves electricity transmission in-
19	frastructure, power generation through the use
20	of a broad power mix (including fossil fuel and
21	renewable energy), or energy efficiency; or
22	(ii) advances electricity storage projects,
23	smart grid projects, distributed generation mod-
24	els, or other technological innovations, as ap-
25	propriate; and

1	(B) is located in a European or Eurasian
2	country.
3	(3) Preference.—In selecting among projects
4	that are eligible under paragraph (2), the agencies
5	described in subsection (a) shall give preference to
6	projects that—
7	(A) link the energy systems of 2 or more
8	European or Eurasian countries;
9	(B) have already been identified by the
10	European Commission as being integral for the
11	energy security of European countries;
12	(C) are expected to enhance energy market
13	integration;
14	(D) can attract funding from the private
15	sector, an international financial institution, the
16	government of the country in which the project
17	will be carried out, or the European Commis-
18	sion; or
19	(E) have the potential to use United States
20	goods and services during project implementa-
21	tion.
22	(c) Types of Assistance.—
23	(1) DIPLOMATIC AND POLITICAL SUPPORT.—
24	The Secretary of State shall provide diplomatic and
25	political support to the European Commission and

1	the governments of European and Eurasian coun-
2	tries, as necessary, including by using the diplomatic
3	and political influence and expertise of the Depart-
4	ment of State to build the capacity of those coun-
5	tries to resolve any impediments to the development
6	of projects selected under subsection (b).
7	(2) EARLY-STAGE PROJECT SUPPORT.—The Di-
8	rector of the Trade and Development Agency shall
9	provide early-stage project support with respect to
10	projects selected under subsection (b), as necessary.
11	(3) Late-stage project support.—Agencies
12	described in subsection (a) that provide late-stage
13	project support shall do so with respect to projects
14	selected under subsection (b), as necessary.
15	(d) Funding.—
16	(1) Private sector investment.—The agen-
17	cies described in subsection (a)—
18	(A) are authorized to obligate and expend
19	not more than \$1,000,000,000 to support pri-
20	vate sector investment in projects that diversify
21	the energy sources and energy transport capa-
22	bilities of European and Eurasian countries and
23	to improve energy market integration in those
24	countries; and

1	(B) shall ensure that amounts from such
2	investments are available for fiscal years 2020
3	through 2024 for debt financing and insurance
4	for projects under this section.
5	(2) Authorization of appropriations for
6	TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT AGENCY.—There are au-
7	thorized to be appropriated to the Director of the
8	Trade and Development Agency for each of fiscal
9	years 2020 through 2024—
10	(A) \$5,000,000 to provide assistance under
11	this section; and
12	(B) such sums as may be necessary for the
13	Agency to employ additional personnel to pro-
14	vide such assistance.
15	(3) Countering Russian influence fund.—
16	Section 254(b) of the Countering Russian Influence
17	in Europe and Eurasia Act of 2017 (22 U.S.C.
18	9543(b)) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
19	lowing:
20	"(7) To assist United States agencies in pro-
21	viding assistance under section 4 of the European
22	Energy Security and Diversification Act of 2019.".
23	SEC. 5. PROGRESS REPORTS.
24	Not later than one year after the date of the enact-
25	ment of this Act, and annually thereafter, the President

1	shall submit to the Committee on Foreign Relations of the
2	Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the
3	House of Representatives a report on progress made in
4	providing assistance for projects under section 4 that in-
5	cludes—
6	(1) a description of the energy infrastructure
7	projects the United States has identified for such as-
8	sistance; and
9	(2) for each such project—
10	(A) a description of the role of the United
11	States in the project, including in early-stage
12	project support and late-stage project support;
13	(B) the amount and form of any debt fi-
14	nancing and insurance provided by the United
15	States Government for the project;
16	(C) the amount and form of any early-
17	stage project support; and
18	(D) an update on the progress made on
19	the project as of the date of the report.
20	Amend the title to read as follows: "A bill to prioritize
21	the efforts of and enhance coordination among United
22	States agencies to encourage European and Eurasian
23	countries to diversify their energy sources and supply
24	routes, increase Europe's energy security, and help the

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1 United States reach its global energy security goals, and

2 for other purposes.".
