1 are safe, and schools and universities are not tar-2 geted for attacks or use by the military; 3 (5) expresses grave concern for the safety and 4 security of hundreds of thousands of Rohingya refu-5 gees who previously fled the Tatmadaw, and now 6 face challenging conditions in camps like Cox's 7 Bazar and Bhasan Char in Bangladesh or risk being 8 turned away or moved into holding centers in other 9 neighboring countries; 10 (6) calls on the President, the Secretary of 11 State, and the Secretary of Defense to fully imple-12 ment section 7008 of the Department of State, For-13 eign Operations, and Related Programs Appropria-14 tions Act, 2021 (division K of Public Law 116–260) 15 and any similar or successor law governing United 16 States foreign assistance following a coup d'etat, 17 and to immediately— 18 (A) impose targeted restrictions aimed at 19 the Tatmadaw, military-owned or controlled en-20 terprises, and those responsible for the Feb-21 ruary 1, 2021, coup; 22 (B) work with the international commu-23 nity, including at the United Nations Security 24 Council, with United States allies in the region, 25 and with the Association of Southeast Asian

1	Nations, to condemn the coup and take steps to
2	ensure that international economic engagement
3	in Burma does not contribute to human rights
4	abuses and enrich individuals connected to the
5	coup;
6	(C) support conditionality on diplomatic,
7	economic, and security relations with Burma,
8	including using the voice and vote of the United
9	States at multilateral development institutions,
10	until all those detained in the February 1,
11	2021, coup are released and there has been a
12	full restoration of civilian-controlled parliament
13	respecting the November 8, 2020, election re-
14	sults; and
15	(D) utilize the United States Government's
16	position on the United Nations Security Council
17	to bring about greater international cooperation
18	in the pursuit of justice and accountability in
19	Burma; and
20	(7) urges the Secretary of State to swiftly con-
21	duct an Interagency Process and issue a determina-
22	tion as to whether the crimes committed by the Bur-
23	mese military against the Rohingya beginning in Au-
24	gust 2017 constitute crimes against humanity or
25	genocide.
